From the Director

Another year starts fast out of the gates. It is already October and the leaves are falling. Where did September go?

WATI has a few changes to share with you. First, I would like to say good bye to three WATI consultants and introduce two new consultants. Mary Pallaske, CESA 4; Paula Lees, CESA 7; and Joanne Laurich, CESA 8, have all taken on other positions. We wish them well but will miss them greatly. Lillian Rider will take Mary's place in CESA 4 and Patti

Lindstrom Drescher will fill the CESA 7 position. This year there will be no CESA 8 WATI consultant. The decision was made to split the area into East/West sections. Marcia Obukowicz from CESA 9 will cover the Western districts and Patti Lindstrom Drescher will cover the Eastern districts.

A second change will impact all WATI lending library users. We are working on a procedure for WATI to pay the return shipping cost of borrowed items. We know that districts do

not have funds set aside for shipping library items so we have allocated some of our budget to cover those costs. Hopefully by the end of October, the procedure will be in place. awarded to Child Care and Head Start programs that included children with disabilities. The focus was on picture supported environments and using Boardmaker as a teacher tool for creating those pictures. This is the second group of these *Picture This!* grants. The findings from the first twelve are on our website. The additional findings from this year will be added to the site as soon as they are in. The second group of mini-grants was awarded to 12 early childhood programs that were interested in implementing assistive technology. They received \$600 worth of AT to meet the needs of their particular

program. The findings are being collected and will also be shared on our website soon.

This year we have awarded mini-grants to five AT teams to attend the Creating Communication Environments class being taught in CESAs 1, 2, and 11. These teams focus on two students and, through the course of the year, they implement strategies they learn about in their four class sessions. Each time they return to class with a video tape of the students' progress. With the guidance of the class instructors and the input from other teams in the class, they seek to identify the augmentative communication solution to help each child become a more

meaningful communicator. This class has been offered for many years through WATI. I encourage you to look at the description on our website (under Training) and consider sending a team in the future. It's a powerful class.

I'm sure many readers of *The Monitor* can report good things happening for students using AT. I would love to hear from some of you. The more we can demonstrate the value of assistive technology the more others will be willing to consider it for their students. Send me an email and tell your story!

Leadership Institute members demonstrate their AT knowledge beyond a beginner level, practice "best practice" when using AT, and provide AT leadership within their area of influence. Please join us on December 7th at the Holiday Inn Convention & Expo Center in Stevens Point for **"Making the Most of Digital Texts: Evidence-Based Strategies**

for Improving Reading Comprehension of Content Area Materials". Lynne Anderson-Ingman, Ph. D., National Center for Supported eText, will lead us in an interactive workshop on using digital texts to improve reading comprehension for students with disabilities. Three major topics will be introduced, followed by examples, activities, and recommendations. The first is "supported e-text" - 11 different ways in which digital texts have been and can be enhanced to support reading comprehension. The second comprises of specific strategies students can use to improve their reading and

understanding on any digital texts used in the classroom. The third is NIMAS, the National Instructional Materials Accessibility Standard, which requires all textbook publishers to make digital versions of their texts available to students with print disabilities. All content emerges from federally funded research.

I really appreciate the technology and how it helps me to be able to play different music from all over so people can have fun".

Although Traveain has cerebral palsy and is in a wheelchair, he has found some exciting ways to express himself through music

and share his passion with others. Ideally, he would like to consider a career using his music spinning abilities. Traveain gets a lot of joy seeing people happily dancing to his music!

work. It really has made a difference in his ability to complete his assignments independently and to express himself in his own words.
